On Your Child's First Day

On Your Child's First Day at St Michaels First school;

They will be greeted at the front black door at 8.40 by their class teacher and teaching assistant who will welcome them into school. They will then help them to find their peg and settle into the classroom. They will then spend time getting to know their new class. It will be kept very informal and the adult will spend time playing with your child.



What will my child need to bring to Reception?



A warm waterproof coat

things in one place.


Where will they keep their personal belonging?

Pegs:

Each child has their own peg where they will keep their personal items such as coats, sun hats, lunch boxes.

They will keep their water bottle in the classroom with them.

Objects from home: We ask that your child does not bring any items in from home as they can easily become lost or broken and children get very upset.



Daily Timetable

A typical day;

- Arrive at (8.40 am) Wake up work, register
- Outdoor & indoor activities, including Maths and Literacy.
- Worship
- •Fruit & Milk/ break time
- Outdoor & indoor activities, including Maths and Literacy.
- Lunchtime
- Daily phonics
- Outdoor & indoor activities child lead learning
- Story & home time (3.15 pm)

PE is on a Friday.



At the end of the school day

Children will be dismissed from the same black door at 3.15 by their class teacher.

Please line up along the front of the building and children will be dismissed one at a time.

We will only dismiss children to their adults. If arrangements have changed please contact the school office.

If children are booked into Out Of School Care, they will be taken straight to the Out Of School Care provision.

If you would like to book your child into OSC please see me at the end and I can arrange that for you.



Clothing

Clothing: All children at St Michaels wear our St-Michaels uniform this can be purchased Crested School Wear either in store or on-line.

P.E. Kits: Children will need to bring a P.E kit into school in a named bag to keep on their peg. This consists of black shorts and tracksuit with a white school PE top, trainers are required for outdoor P.E pumps are not required. This will be kept at school for them to change into. This year due to health and safety we are no longer able to hang string PE bags on pegs so we ask that you send the kit in a carrier bag or fabric shoulder bag with their name one.

Please ensure that all clothing that your child wears or brings into school, is clearly named.

Food and Drink

Lunch: At lunchtime your child can have a packed lunch prepared at home and brought into school, or a school dinner. Lunchtime is between 11.45-12.45 where the children will go into the hall to eat and then spend time outdoors playing with their friends.

All early years and Key Stage 1 children are entitled to a free school meal each day. There will be a selection of different meals available each day for your child to choose from. Vegetarian options are always available. Please let us know if your child has any other dietary restrictions or requirements.

Packed lunches should support our school's healthy eating policy; note that FIZZY DRINKS/SWEETS/CHOCOLATE are not allowed in school lunches.

Snacks: Children will receive a FREE PIECE OF FRUIT/HEALTHY SNACK during the day. They do not need to bring any other snacks into school.

Free Milk; All children under 5 receive free milk. Once your child turns 5 you will have the option to pay for milk.

Drinks: Please can your child bring a water bottle into school everyday. This should only have water in (no juice) and will be available all day. Please ensure that the bottle is named.

Curriculum


We follow the Early Years Foundation stage curriculum and cover the 7 areas of learning by providing a broad, balanced and ambitious curriculum.

Pupils will be given the opportunity to learn and explore through play, both indoors and out.

We plan carefully to meet the needs of all pupils. The first two weeks in reception we will be carrying out the EYFS BASELINE assessment. This allows us to really get to know all pupils and enables us to plan for their next steps.

The RBA is a short, interactive and practical assessment of your child's early literacy, communication, language and mathematics skills when they begin school, using materials that most children of your child's age will be familiar with. It is statutory for all schools.

You do not need to do anything to prepare your child for the assessment. Your child is unlikely to even know that they are doing an assessment when they are completing the tasks.

What Is the EYFS?

The Early Years Foundation Stage covers the first stage of a child's care from birth to five years old. It sets the standards to ensure that all children learn and develop, as well as keeping them healthy and safe.

Also included in the EYFS are the **seven Areas of Learning**. They are:

- Communication and Language
- Personal, Social and Emotional Development
- Physical Development
- Literacy
- Mathematics
- Understanding the World
- Expressive Arts and Design

At the end of the EYFS, there are **17 Early Learning Goals** that children are expected to achieve.



Some Key Aspects

There is more of an emphasis on the importance of developing communication and language skills.

- Children should be supported in building up vocabulary by increasing the amount of words they know and can use.
- Encourage more conversations between adults and children, but also children and their peers.
- Good language skills are the basis for all other learning and social interaction, so this is vital to focus on.



Some Key Aspects

There is a focus on how reading stories is important to help children develop in all of Areas of Learning.

- Daily reading of stories encourages an enjoyment of reading from a young age.
- Lots of other learning opportunities happen when looking at books, for example comparisons of culture or the past.
- Listening to stories develops imagination, ideas and language.
- Reading is an essential skill and so should be shown to children, as well as practiced by them regularly.
- Children are also encouraged to use story ideas in their play
- We teach phonic everyday to support children on their learning journey. I will be holding a parent information session duranteem Autumn term to share more information on phonics.

Some Key Aspects

There is a focus on encouraging healthy choices overall and an understanding of oral health.

- Required to teach children the importance of brushing teeth.
- Supervised toothbrushing is not expected in settings and schools.
- Focus on helping children to understand which choices to make that will help them to be healthy, for example which foods to eat and why.
- Getting into good routines from a young age is important as these often continue into adult life.



Assessments

At St Michaels we use a document called 'Development Matters'. This document is not compulsory but it can be used by staff to support them to understand child development in the different Areas of Learning.


We assess children throughout the year through observations to support those who may need a little extra support.

Seesaw will be used to record any new learning that adults feel are 'wow' moments.

At the end of Reception children are assessed children are assessed against the 17 Early Learning Goals.

Goals. Staff will assess if a child is on track or developing to help their next class teacher.

Transition/ Induction arrangements.....

You will be invited to transition afternoons where your child will be able to attend their new class for a few afternoons during the summer term. During this time they will be able to meet the staff and get to know some of the children.

These dates are as follows;

Tuesday 25th June: 1pm - 3pm

Thursday 4th July: 1pm - 3pm

Wednesday 10th July: 1pm - 3pm

Each session will run from 1.00-3pm

All children will start Reception full time at 8.40 on Tuesday 3rd September 2024

Should we feel that your child needs a slower induction in September we will discuss and personalise a transition plan with you.

How you can help your child to be Reception ready.....

To enable your child to become increasingly independent we would like to work with you to encourage children to:

- Fasten their own coat and other clothing, put their own shoes on and get changed for P.E.
- Manage their own personal hygiene, e.g. go to the toilet independently and wash their hands.
- Use a knife and fork correctly.
- Encourage them to take responsibility for their belongings eg; get their own bag, water bottle.

Please ensure that all clothing that your child wears or brings into school, is clearly named. This include water bottles, coats and shoes!



Will my child be reception ready?

Can they recognise or write their name?

Can they hold a pencil correctly? Giving meanings to the marks they make?

Encourage them to listen to stories, be patient and take turns.

Can they count objects and recognise numbers up to 10?

Can they talk about colours and shapes?

Can they take turns in conversations?




Parents as partners

- Seesaw will allow us to share with you all the fun activities and learning opportunities that take place each week in Reception. You will also be able to share any new learning from home.
- Homework; in line with the new curriculum we have continued to place emphasis on reading. Following the baseline assessments all pupils will be given a reading book and phonic flash cards to learn at home. Once children have learnt their phonic flash cards they will move onto reading words. These flash cards will be sent home to practice. We ask that you spend 5-10 minutes every evening going over these flash cards and reading with your child. Little and often really does have a great impact.

As the year progresses further homework will be set for childrent extend their learning at home.
